Introduction of the program by Joanne Olszewski: Zeb Gattis, the CES intern working under Collin Massey,

- Blackberries are the leading crop of the university's fruit breeding program and 43 varieties have been developed so far, generating almost \$1.5 million in blackberry royalties since 2020, according the university's fruit breeding program webpage."
- "Blackberry varieties at the [Arkansas Fruit Research] station [in Clarksville]
 have already been developed to provide a higher crop yield; firmer fruit
 that will hold up in storage with less decay, improved flavor and enhanced
 sweetness; larger fruit; thornless fruit; and fruit that will ripen earlier."
- "As climate change events like freezes and drought become more common, the need for research increases, as those events make certain fruit crops more susceptible to a poor growing season."
